
Looks Like Biden! Now what?

The first day of the election has finished and it looks very much like Biden could bag the presidency. Without putting too much emphasis on *schadenfreude*, I have this picture in my head when, or if, Biden gets elected. Looters and rioters tearing down cities because of gross injustices caused by Trump, the great white Satan, suddenly realise that Trump has been voted out.

To be honest, the electoral college is a bit of an oddity compared with the way many other democratic nations select their leaders.
